

Delay angers pool group

LINGERING doubts over Oakleigh pool's future are causing Community Life Action Group members to boil over with frustration.

Last Tuesday, Sports Minister Justin Madden reserved a pool from the FINA world championships as a replacement for the nearby East Bentleigh Memorial Pool in the City of Glen Eira.

Cr Stephen Dimopoulos said Monash hadn't lost an opportunity with the FINA pool and was on a "different timeline". "I didn't expect to get it at all, I expected it to go to a marginal seat."

Monash Council's community consultation on three future options for Oakleigh pool may be delayed until February, because final costings on the options haven't been completed.

He said all three options — to retain the pool, to have a splash-pud water park or a hybrid option — would require State Government Better Pools funding.

"We're going to need an extra bit of funding for any of the options.

"[Oakleigh MP] Ann Barker and I have spoken about this a couple of times...ha, she's a very good activist for the local area and I've got confidence she can secure the funds."
